Program and Purpose

Each year outstanding student leaders are nominated by their educators to participate in Lone Star Leadership Academy camps. Upon completion of these leadership programs, alumni are invited to join Education in Action's alumni organization, the Lone Star Youth Leadership Council, to receive a structured and guided opportunity to continue their leadership training during the school year. This year's lessons focused on setting reachable goals, writing personal mission statements, choosing friends wisely, defining your talents, developing critical thinking skills, how to motivate others to want to help you, and how to show appreciation for the help of others. These skills were honed and put into action through service projects members were responsible for creating and leading in their communities. Project requirements included finding a sponsor, creating a project action plan, incorporating the assistance of at least two peers, and documenting projects in an electronic presentation.

Members who successfully complete program requirements have the opportunity to return to Lone Star Leadership Academy camps as Youth Facilitators. Youth Facilitators mentor younger students participating in the Lone Star Leadership Academy and receive additional leadership training during the experience.

Sara Casas, A. C. Jones High School, Beeville ISD

Sara will graduate with the Distinguished Graduation Plan and 24 hours of college credit through the Dual Credit program from Coastal Bend College. She is a member of the National Junior Honor Society and National Honor Society and has been on the Honor Roll since 2008. Sara is a United States Achievement All American Scholar, is in Who's Who Among All-American Scholars, and was part of the United State Achievement Academy and Girls State, both in 2014. Sara has played on the Varsity Golf Team for four years and was named the Varsity Golf Team's MVP the past two years. Sara is very involved with Future Farmers

of America (FFA) and showing heifers. She has been the FFA district treasurer and is currently FFA President. She won Grand Champion Commercial Pen of Heifers, the Reserve Grand Champion Craft, Reserve Grand Champion Commercial Pen of Heifers in 2014-2015, numerous awards for livestock production, and agricultural sales contests. This fall Sara will attend Texas A & M University to major in Agricultural Science with a teaching option to become a certified Agricultural Science teacher. She was awarded the Corpus Christi Caller Scholars Scholarship and a Delta Kappa Gamma Scholarship. Sara attended the Lone Star Leadership Academy - Austin camp and has been a member of the Lone Star Youth Leadership Council for six years. Wilson Clark, Robert E. Lee High School, Midland ISD

Wilson is a member of the National Honor Society, orchestra, debate team, cross country team, and the Lee High School AFJROTC where he served as Corps Commander. He has served for four years as a teen attorney for Midland Teen Court and for five years as the teen representative on the Midland Soup Kitchen Board of Directors. He is a volunteer for Keep Midland Beautiful, and has been a volunteer for the Commemorative Air Force and a member of the Students in Philanthropy, Midland County Library for four years. Wilson will attend Texas A&M as a member of the Fall 2015 Corps of Cadets. He attended the Lone Star Leadership Academy - Austin and Houston camps. Wilson, a 7th year member of the Lone Star Youth

Leadership Council, took his required annual service project to the next level by turning a toy collection drive for children in crisis situations into a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, Toys for Cops. Through Toys for Cops, Wilson has collected thousands of toys which have been distributed to children through advocacy groups including Crime Stoppers, Midland Sheriff's Office Crisis Intervention Department, Ector County Hospital Police, Ector County School Police, and Children's Protective Service's Rainbow Room. So far this year, Toys for Cops has collected over 5000 toys. Wilson holds toy collections and fundraisers throughout the year because, he stated, "There are children in crisis 365 days a year." For his efforts Wilson has received numerous awards and recognitions including the 2014-2015 Top 10 State of Texas Prudential Community Spirit Award, the ROTC National Sojourner's Award, and the President's Volunteer Service Award three times. Wilson was also named one of the 52 Faces of Volunteerism by the Midland Reporter Telegram and a Peace First Semi-Finalist.



Jessica James, Lovejoy High School, Lovejoy ISD

Jessica is graduating with Lovejoy High School's Leadership Award, the Girl Scout Gold Award, the U.S. Presidential Gold Service Award for 250 volunteer hours in one calendar year, and Most-Liked Graduate Profile for Fine Arts/Photography. Jessica placed third at the Lovejoy High School AP Fine Arts Community Showcase. She is a member of the Varsity Swim Team and the Girls' Varsity Bowling Team and qualified for state in bowling this year. Her volunteer activities include Lovejoy Buddies, a group that mentors special needs students by involving them in regular school activities and monthly social activities outside of school, Reading with the Leopards, a program in which she reads to and mentors younger students, and Cardboard

Box City. Jessica taught Vacation Bible School, and is part of United Methodist Action Reach-Out Missions (Youth UM ARMY) and the Student Adult Leadership Team. Jessica will attend Abilene Christian University this fall to major in Pre-Med/Biology on her path to a future career as a pediatric gastroenterologist. Jessica received two scholarships from Abilene Christian University including one merit-based and one venturing and scouting scholarship. Jessica attended the Lone Star Leadership Academy – Austin and Houston camps. During Jessica's four years on the Lone Star Youth Leadership Council she, with her grandmother's guidance, made 100 dresses for girls in Cameroon, Africa. She also made Hygiene Kits for the residents of West, Texas after the April 2013 fertilizer plant explosion and another 100 Hygiene Kits for residents at Samaritan Inn.

Molly will graduate in the top 4% of her class, is a member of the National Honor Society, and has been awarded the Kingwood High School award for academic excellence every year of high school, including awards for biology, world history, US history, and JV theater. Molly is involved in her church youth group and a member of the United Methodist Action Reach-Out Missions (UM ARMY). She has been on three mission trips and will make her fourth trip in June. While helping at UM ARMY camp, she built wheelchair ramps, helped re-roof a house, and repaired and painted homes and household items for people unable to do so for themselves. Molly works as a nanny for two children of a single mother and tutors high school

students in biology, algebra, and geometry. In the fall Molly will attend either Southern Methodist University or Texas Christian University and major in history and education. She has been awarded a top academic scholarship at each school including the Second Century Scholarship at SMU and the Dean's Scholarship at TCU. Molly is an Education in Action Trailblazer, having attended all three Lone Star Leadership Academy camps and returned on the Lone Star Leadership Academy camps as a Youth Facilitator. She has been a member of the Lone Star Youth Leadership Council for five years. Most of Molly's service projects have benefited Texas Children's Hospital. She has provided hundreds of board games, arts and crafts supplies, and books over the years. Jane is enrolled in an EMT course at Brookhaven College to help build a good foundation for her future medical career. In the fall Jane will attend the University of Texas at Austin for a double major in music and nursing. Jane participated in the Lone Star Leadership Academy – Houston camp and has been a member of the Lone Star Youth Leadership Council for four years. Jane's service projects have all concentrated on a place close to her heart, the Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Learning Center. She has run the annual carnival for the center each year. She is a National Merit Commended Scholar and a member of the National Honor Society, National English Honor Society, and National Science Honor Society. Sara is an accomplished flute and piccolo player and is a member of the Houston Youth Symphony and the National Flute Association High School Flute Choir. She is a Texas All-State First Chair Piccolo and a Texas State UIL Solo Competition Outstanding Performer. She received the Outstanding Musicianship Award from the Foundation for Music Education and was Drum Major for her high school band. Sarah participated in the Jones State Forest Environmental Initiative as a Senior Scientist Team

Leader and placed in the ExxonMobil Texas State Science & Engineering Fair each of four years. She received outstanding achievement and excellence awards at the Science Engineering Fair of Houston, outstanding achievement from the Society for In Vitro Biology, and placed in the Senior Division with the Society of Women Engineers. 
